

Habitat Celebrates Completion of Wright Family Home

On the afternoon of May 30th, beneath a blue Texas sky, laughter spilled from the porch of the newest Fayette County Habitat for Humanity home in La Grange. It wasn't the clatter of hammers or the buzz of construction tools; this time it was something warmer. The sound of family. The sound of joy. The sound of home.

Joined by Habitat volunteers, staff, donors, and supporters, Johnny Wright and his four children; Demarion, Dereon, Dylan, and Sydney stood together to receive the keys to their new home during a blessing ceremony that filled the home with emotion, gratitude, and celebration.

"It's always wonderful when we get to do this and you immediately hear what a real home sounds like," said Habitat Executive Director, Kenny Couch.

The home blessing ceremony marked the end of a long journey for the Wright family and the beginning of a new one. For months, Johnny and Demarion worked side by side with volunteers putting in the "sweat equity" that Habitat asks of every partner family.

The home itself is a stately brown with crisp white trim. Centered at the front is a small, welcoming porch that beckons to friends and family. The Wright kids are already dreaming up adventures for the back yard.

Among the friends gathered at the ceremony was Habitat Board Member, Curtis Bradbury, who delivered the blessing. After gathering everyone into the living room, heads were bowed and the house filled with a calm silence. "God of laughter, God of Joy, we give you thanks for this time together, to be with one another, and to look forward to the joyful noise that will be in this house with

laughter and love," he prayed. "We also give thanks for the blood, sweat, and tears. The drawing and imagination, that went into this home.

That joyful noise could be heard throughout the ceremony in the sound of children giggling, friends chatting, and supporters embracing one another, proud of what they helped accomplish.

As with every Habitat project, the Wright house was not built alone. It was the result of months of hard work by hundreds of volunteers, donors, and supporters; each playing a role in making this dream come true. Volunteers sawed lumber and swung hammers. Small businesses donated supplies and food. Local contractors

"Every home that Habitat builds is a testimony to the amazing things this community can do when we come together," said Habitat Fundraising Committee Chair, Meg Keilbach. "We don't just build houses, we build a strong foundation for the futures of the families we serve."

Johnny Wright wiped away tears as he thanked the crowd. "This is amazing," Wright said. "This is more for my children than it is for me. Thank y'all. Much love and respect. God bless y'all. I'll appreciate it for ever and ever. Y'all will never be forgotten."

For the Wright's, this home represents more than shelter. It's stability. It's pride. It's a safe place to raise children, host Sunday dinners, celebrate birthdays, and weather life's storms.

The completion of the Wright home marks the latest success in Fayette County Habitat's mission to provide affordable housing to hard working families in need. But it is far from the last.

As the ceremony wound down, guests lingered while sharing hugs and snapping photos.

"It's always surreal walking away from one of our home for the last time," remarked Couch. "It's the first time we leave the lights on. We don't have keys anymore. It's not a Habitat project anymore, it's the Wright Family home.

At the end of the night the porch light burned bright and the sounds of a family made a house a home.

We sat down with Rotary Club of La Grange President, Josh Vandever to learn more about this amazing organization.

What is the mission of the Rotary Club of La Grange?
The Rotary Club's mission is to serve others, promote high ethical standards, and advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace

through its fellowship of business, professional, and community leaders.

What inspired the club to support Habitat this year?

Rotary seeks to make an impact not only internationally but within our community as well. We, as a club, enjoy making tangible positive impacts on people's lives and what better way to do so than to help provide one of life's very basic needs... shelter.

How did members respond when the idea of supporting the Wright home appliances was presented?

Committing funds to a charity is a rewarding but at times difficult process. Unfortunately the funds are limited and we can't provide financial support to everyone. The decision to support the appliance purchase and install for the Wright home was a no-brainer. It was met with almost immediate consensus. The decision was "let's do it, we'll find the money."

What does "Service Above Self" mean to your club members in practice?

In our club, our service projects are the number one draw (in my opinion). I think the strongest recruiting tool that we have aside from being an enjoyable group of

people from all generations, is that we actually make a tangible difference in our community and in our world. Whether it's hanging up lights at Monument Hill, raising money for scholarships, or packing meals for people in third-world countries, it simply feels good to use your own two hands to serve others.

Can you share some of the other ways your club has supported local families in the past?

We have funded essential repairs to woefully substandard housing to assist individuals that could otherwise not afford it. We have provided financial support to the Child Welfare Board, including the purchase of Christmas presents every year for children who may otherwise go without. We also annually provide thousands of dollars in scholarships to local youths in order to assist them in pursuing their education.

Why is affordable housing important to the well-being of La Grange and Fayette County?

As stated earlier, "shelter" is one of life's very basic needs. For one to have any quality of life they need first to have shelter. Maybe less obvious is the need for affordable housing to exist as a manner by which economic development can

happen. Positive economic growth cannot happen within our community if there are not houses for the people that need to work in the businesses investing in our area. Growth is inevitable, good growth can only happen with good, affordable housing options. Without, I'm afraid that the growth that awaits us is not positive at all.

What do you think makes Habitat for Humanity a good partner for Rotary?

I think the fact that Fayette County Habitat for Humanity here has a leadership team that is actively engaged in the community is a huge thing for the Rotary Club of La Grange. It isn't a nameless, faceless organization. It's a community lead, community focused group that has done a fantastic job responding to local needs.

What advice would you give to someone looking to get more involved with Rotary?

The number one thing I would tell them is that you aren't too old or too young to join. I think our youngest member is 25 or so and out of kindness I'll not say who or how old our oldest member is. It's a great group of people that has a ton of fun when we get together and learn about things going on in our community. I'd like to invite anyone to our meeting every Wednesday at noon at the Czech Heritage and Cultural Center in La Grange (at the fairgrounds).

What up coming projects or fundraisers is the Rotary Club of La Grange excited about?

Up next is our hamburger booth at the Fayette County Fair! Please come out and contribute to a good cause, whether it be with Rotary Club membership or just by coming out and supporting us at one of our fundraising events. You're always invited and you're always welcome!

Fayette County Habitat for Humanity is proud to announce that our beloved resale shop, *Habitat Home Supply*, is officially in the process of rebranding as a Habitat ReStore. This change marks an exciting new chapter for our organization and community, aligning us more closely with Habitat for Humanity's national identity while honoring the incredible local support that has brought us to this point.

This transformation comes at a milestone moment, it's been three years since our doors first opened in June 2022. In that time, our shop has grown from a small fundraising initiative into a vital part of Fayette County Habitat's operations. We've welcomed thousands of shoppers, processed tons of donations, and with the help of generous donors, tireless volunteers, and savvy shoppers we have raised more than \$100,000 to support affordable home construction in our community. That funding most recently helped build the Wright family's new home in La Grange and continues to fuel our efforts in Fayette County.

While our name is changing, our mission remains the same; to bring people together to build homes, communities, and hope. The Habitat ReStore model is designed to do just that. Habitat ReStores are nonprofit home improvement stores and donation centers operated by local Habitat affiliates. They sell new and gently used furniture, appliances,

building materials, home décor, tools, and more at prices far below retail. Every purchase and every donation at the ReStore helps fund Habitat's work in Fayette County; providing safe, affordable homes for local families.

But the benefits go far beyond housing. The ReStore is also a place where sustainability meets community impact. By keeping usable goods out of the landfill, ReStores promote environmental responsibility while giving community members access to affordable materials for their own home projects. Whether you're a first-time homeowner, a longtime DIYer, a landlord, a craftsman, or someone on a tight budget; there's something for you at the ReStore. You might find a like-new kitchen sink for your remodel, a gently used washer and dryer at an unbeatable price, or a piece of vintage furniture just waiting for a second life.

To better serve our community and make it easier to donate and shop, we're also extending our store hours. Beginning this month (July), the Fayette County Habitat ReStore will be open every Friday and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at our same location in Schulenburg: 825 N.
